Thre Ramsay Block, built in 1888 by Mr. George Mann, is the building next to the brick Mulliken Block. It is the earliest of the buildings on this stretch of Central Street.



Miss Martin's Millinery store and Ira Ramsay's men's store shared the space on the street level of this building until 1899 when Craig and Knight took over the millinery space for a grocery store.

The building changed hands several times in the early years. Mr. Mann sold to Mr. Mulliken, who sold it in 1923 to George and Florence Hood. Candy and tobacco stores, and a bakery utilized this building until 1932 when the Miller Brothers, sons of Dr. Edward Miller, opened a radio shop. The Miller brothers, Sumner and Edward, only used half of the space. Donald Hadley used the other half for a few years, making keys and jigsaw puzzles. Later on, in 1934, Roland Pudvah, Lee Tegu's Uncle, opened a shoe repair beside the Miller brothers.

The Millers took over the entire space in 1935. After the war, Max Stewart, who had worked for the Miller Brothers, took over the store. He moved the business to Montebello Street in 1951.

Clayton Placey purchased the building in 1969 and opened the “Coffee Cup”.



The last tenants before the fire in early 1000’s were the New Century Restaurant and Schaefer Chalet. This space is a vacant lot at this time (2008).

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
