

Mr. Little sold it to Isaac Smith and Moses Campbell. Smith and Campbell might have sold it to a Mr. Cotton as he was there in the early 1800's. Mills Olcott purchased the mill on April 9,1809 for the sum of \$400.00. Olcott was first to build a dam and mill on the site. Olcott deeded the mill to William Styfield on 9-14-1827. Styfield, in return, leased it to John L. Woods and Samuel Hutchins in 1830. Woods, at some time, obtained total ownership of the mill and sold it to Charles Smith in 1864 (Smith and Johnson).

Smith put in the equipment and machinery to produce shovel handles. Smith's mill and dam washed out in 1878 and he died before he could rebuild.

When Lois Litz was a student at Monson High School, she played basketball the old-fashioned way. For girls, that meant a half-court game. Forwards on one side of the center line, guards on the other. Three on three, and no crossing over. "I played center, so I got to score points," she said. Score she did - 278 as a senior for an average of 17.8 per game.

That was in 1941, when the original rules of girls basketball - as written in 1892 by physical education professor Senda Berenson at Smith College of Northampton - were still in effect.

With Litz as their team captain, the Monson girls of 69 years ago won the Valley Wheel championship. She also played four years of high school tennis, again serving as team captain.

"I won a lot of matches, but nobody kept records. Our basketball games made the papers, but our tennis scores never did," she said.

Although Litz played in an era when the general public knew or cared little about girls high school sports, her athletic achievements have not been overlooked.

Thanks to good work by Monson's Athletic Hall of Fame, she will be enshrined as a member of the Class of 2010. The ceremonies will take place Saturday, Oct. 2, at the Valhalla Restaurant.

Also being enshrined: Kim Marsden Bailey 1991, soccer-softball-basketball; Rae Ann Darling Reed 1991, cross country and track; Peter Beaupre Jr., 1994, soccer-basketball-baseball; Dan Moran 2001, swimming and cross country; Rob Charest 2004, soccer-basketball-baseball; and Diana Roberts, coach of field hockey, basketball and softball.

Monson's 1957 Western Mass. boys soccer co-champions and its girls basketball teams of 1957-58-59 also will be honored. Fisk Bacon, one of Monson's star athletes of the late 1940s, had much to do with the election of Litz, whom he remembered from his growing-up years. He lived on Bethany Road, around the corner from the Litz family's residence on State Street.

"I was a gym rat when I was a kid," he said. "After (elementary) school, I'd go over to the high school gym. The girls played at 3 o'clock, so I got to see a lot of their games. I paid special attention to Lois because I knew her and her family. Besides, she was an outstanding athlete. Monson didn't have soccer or softball back then. If they did, she would have been a star in those sports, too."

When Monson launched its Hall of Fame in 2007, Bacon served on the nominating committee. He wanted to nominate Litz, but needed more than his childhood memories of her. The committee required some documentation of her playing career. "I tried off and on for a couple of years, I couldn't find her," Bacon said. After considerable detective work, he finally found that Lois was living as a retiree in Kennebunk, Maine.

"I called and asked her if she had any clippings or information from her sports career," he said. Did she ever. Litz provided the Hall of Fame committee with 12 pages of information, some of it covering her basketball career at Monson High, the rest detailing a full life of sports activity that continues to this day.

At 86, she's a regular in the Southern Maine Women's Golf Association, which she joined in 1989. "We play in statewide tournaments every Tuesday, and I have the perfect attendance award. I've never missed a tournament in 21 years - 424 in a row," she said.

In her high school years, she played on basketball teams coached by Henry O. Holley, a revered name in the history of Western Mass. secondary school education.

"Mr. Holley was the school principal, and he was so busy, he seldom had time to come to our practices. But he was always there for our games. I really enjoyed basketball, every minute of it, and my parents were my biggest supporters," she said.

Her father, William Litz, worked at Ellis Mills in Monson. "He couldn't see me play because our games were in the afternoon, when he was working. But every night before a game, he would make me an egg-nog. He said it would help me score points. "My dad couldn't be at the games, but my mother, Corinne, was there for most of them."

In the fall of 1941, Litz entered Massachusetts State College (later to be renamed the University of Massachusetts). She studied science, with a major in chemistry, and still found time to play basketball, volleyball, field hockey, tennis, softball and badminton. "I found that if you're good at one sport, it kind of carries over," she said.

Indeed it did. She was named Mass. State's athlete of the year as a junior. As a senior, she served as president of the college's Women's Athletic Association. "I played first base in softball for Westinghouse in Springfield during the summers, and we won the league championship," she said. Litz's love for all things athletic continued as she began a teaching career that would last 34 years.

At Woodsville, N.H., High School, she taught chemistry, biology and general science, and at various times coached basketball, tumbling, softball and fencing.

"Our principal tried out for the Olympics in fencing, and he taught me what I needed to know to coach it," she said.

Basketball, though, remained her No. 1 sport. In her 14 years at Woodsville, her hoopsters won the Ammonoosuc League title nine teams and posted a record of 168-19. "We had a couple of pretty good winning streaks - 39 and 42 games," she said.

In 1950, Litz gave baseball a try. She won a tryout at first base for a spot in the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League, but had to pass up the

opportunity because of her teaching and coaching jobs. "They wanted me to go to South Bend, Indiana, for training that started in February. I couldn't leave school for that," she said.

Litz left Woodsville for a teaching job at East Hartford, Conn., High School in 1959, then moved to Shrewsbury (Mass.) High School in 1960. She became head of the science department in 1964, and stayed with it until her retirement in 1980.

In 1964, she bought a home in Kennebunk as a summer place. She made it her permanent residence after her retirement.

"I got it for \$10,000 - you can't buy a car for that today. It's an old place, built in the late 1700s, and I love it," she said.

In the mid-'50s, Litz spent summers at the University of New Hampshire, where she earned a master's degree in education. It was while she was at UNH that she first took up golf.

After her retirement, she played softball for in local leagues. "I gave it up when I was 67, because I didn't want to be having a heart attack running the bases," she said.

That decision led her to try yet another sport - candlepin bowling. "Our team won the ladies league in Sanford (Maine) in 2008-09," she said.

As a stalwart in the Southern Maine Women's Golf Association, she has won the senior championship for 18 straight years. From 1993 through 1995, she won the Senior Invitational at Carabasset Valley CC in Maine.

In 1995, she made it to the Senior Olympics national golf tournament in San Antonio, placing fifth in the 70-74 division.

Litz, 5-foot-8 inches tall, never has had a weight problem. "I guess that's because I've always been so busy with sports.

I just love them all. I watch all kinds of sports on TV. If they had tiddley-winks, I'd watch that, too." Litz has been single all her life.

"Who'd want to marry someone who has no time to make supper?" she said. That's Lois Litz - science teacher, coach, Hall of Famer. Her old hometown has not forgotten her.

In 1903 Fred Beebe operated the White House lunch cart across the street from the Tilton Block. In 1915, T. G. Cummings operated a lunch cart in front of Bailey's Buick, until around 1916 when he erected the Woodsville Lunch.

The Dandy Diner was located between the Express Building and the Railroad Depot. In 1933 it was operated by Jasper Rutledge and Merton Homans. It had a 20 stool counter and no tables. The diner was open from 6 a.m. until midnight. Mr. Rutledge also owned the South End Diner at the end of Central Street.

In 1899 Ernest Bell operated a lunch cart. He later opened Bell's Lunch in the Tilton Block annex. This later became Bagonzi's Restauant.

J. C. Pennock had a fish cart from around 1900 until 1913. He delivered from door to door.
