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***Nadeau ...*** John Nadeau is a laborer. John and Florence P. Nadeau have a home at 14 Pleasant Street. (1929-31) John and Florence P. Nadeau now live at 17 Ammonoosuc Street. (1935-37) John Nadeau passed away prior to 1953. Florence is a cook at 39 Central Street, the Hotel Wentworth and she boards in room 16 of the Sargent Block. (1953 - 1958)

***Nash Woodsville Company ...*** The Nash Woodsville Company, Henry E. Lothar and Frederick L. Sargent. Automobile dealers and garage on River Road. In 1929 Maurice Cutting are operating the auto dealership with a garage on the Bath-Haverhill road, corner of Rts. 10 and 302. The building burned in 1942. Cutting rebuilt and then sold to Roland Ames in 1944. It became a Hudson dealership and a trucking company (Ames Transport Company). In 1951 Ames sold to Quinn Transport and it later became Fogg's hardware store. It is now the corner of the Wal-Mart complex. 2009

***National Snow Melting Company ...*** the clerk's office is at # 9 in the Opera Block. Most likely a rock salt provider??? (1915). I do not find any records after 1915.

***Naylon ...*** Leslie G. Naylon is employed at 30 Railroad Street, the Holbrook Grocery Company. Leslie and Beatrice H Naylon have a home at 19 School Street. (1935 - 1937)

***Neighbours ...*** Mrs. Margaret Neighbours, widow of George Neighbours, is boarding at 18 Maple Street, the home of Nathan S. Knight. (1929 - 1937)

***Neiley ...*** Waldo C. Neiley is a turnkey at the Grafton County Jail. Waldo and Viola M. Neiley have a house on the River Road. (1935 - 1937)

***Nelson ...***

\*\*\* Charles E. Nelson died in 1922.

\*\*\* Clinton D. Nelson is a carpenter on the railroad. Clinton and Margaret E. Nelson have a home at 5 Locust Street. (1919) Now living at 60 Park Street. (1925 - 1958)

\*\*\* Miss Edith N. Nelson is a housekeeper at 7 Gibson Place, the home of Clifton W. McCrillis, where she boards. (1929-31)

\*\*\* Miss Elizabeth Nelson is a stenographer at 27 Court Street at

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the business of Rhett Scruggs, hardware. Elizabeth is boarding at 12 Nelson Street, the home of Fred S. Walker. (1929-31)

\*\*\* George Nelson is a laborer. He and Hattie room at William Foshey's on South Court Street. (1915) George and Hattie Nelson have a home on Wilson Avenue. (1929-31)

\*\*\* Hattie Nelson, widow of George Nelson who died prior to 1935, is boarding at Wilson Avenue. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* Mrs. Ida M. Nelson is a housekeeper at 145 Central Street, the home of Frank L. Gilman, where she boards. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* Louis W. Nelson is a laborer. Louis and Marcia R. Nelson have a home at 55 Central Street. (1953 - 2955) Louis passed away prior to 1956. Marcia is residing at 22 Nelson Street. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* Mary L. Nelson, widow of Henry C. Nelson, is boarding at 60 Park Street. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* W. H. Nelson was a painter here in 1872.

\*\*\* W. Henry Nelson is boarding at 60 Park Street the home of Clinton B. Nelson. (1935 - 1937)

***New England Amco Service ...*** C. J. O'Neil is dealing in grain and feed at 21 Smith Street. Possibly in with Walter Burbeck? (1929-31)

***New England & China Tea Company ...*** Mulliken & Davis had a plumbing shop on Pleasant Street until 1900 when they moved the business to the Mulliken Block at 89-93 central Street.

Their space was taken over by the New England & China Tea Company until 1901 when the building burned.

***New England Telephone & Telegraph Co. ...*** NET&T Co. is located at 13 Pleasant Street, room 1. Mrs. Maude A Chesman is chief operator. The NE T&T Co. took over the White Mountain Telephone Company. (1935 - 1945) The office for NE T&T Co. is at 6 North Court Street. (1953 - 1958)

***Newbold ...*** Douglas R. Newbold is manager of the Fred P. Dearth Insurance Agency, 13 Pleasant Street, the Odd Fellows Block, room 3. Douglas and Dorothy D. Newbold have a home at 24 Elm Street. (1925-31) The Newbolds' are now living at 15 Maple Street. (1935 - 1937) The Newbolds' are now living at 7 Elm Street.

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(1953 - 1960) The business moved to the Opera Block bank extension and Marjorie McBride became the agent in later years.

***Newcity ...*** Walter Newcity is a laborer, residing at the Hotel Wentworth. (1956 - 1958)

***Newell ...***

\*\*\* Charles S. Newell ran a restaurant in the Odd fellows Music Hall on Pleasant Street for a short period, around 1897. He took over the space previously occupied by Mr. Lovejoy's meat market. Charles served as the tax collector for about 19 years and acted as auctioneer from time to time. Charles and Edith M. Newell have a house at 41 Court Street. (1915 - 1919)

\*\*\* Solomon S. Newell lived at the Cobleigh Tavern during some of his 69 year life. The tavern, also called the Stage Coach Inn, was a popular and lively stop during the stage coach days.

The stage coach line ran up Rt. 10 from the "Plain" (North Haverhill) and down River Road (So. Court St.) to where a nursery school and now located. The tavern was later turned into the Cottage Hospital.

The Stage line then followed up what is now Melody Lane to between the present locations of the Way We Were Outlet Store and Walker Motors.

Solomon Newell also owned the Atkinson Farm, from 1869 until 1885. The farm was also known as Wallace Hill and Hasting Hill. For more information go to "H", Hastings. Solomon was born in 1816 and died in 1885. Stella, his widow removed to Lynn, Mass.

***New Hampshire State Liquor Store ...*** George H. Hood, manager, located at 89 Central Street, in the Mulliken Block. (1953 - 1958)

***New Hampshire State Welfare ...*** Located at 65 Central Street, in the Opera Block, rooms 11-12. (1953 - 1958)

***Newman Lumber Company ...*** Murdock H. Newman, president and treasurer, is a softwood contractor, operating a saw mill at 72 Smith Street, in Stoneville. (1953 - 1958) Advertised in 1957 as Newman Lumber Co., Inc., and Transit Milling Co. Inc., and Woodsville Building Supply Co., Inc. tele. 7-3730.

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***Newman...*** Murdock H. Newman, president and treasurer is a softwood contractor, operating a saw mill at 72 Smith Street, in Stoneville. Murdock is also president and treasurer of Transit Milling Company, Inc, and Woodsville Building Supply Co. Inc., atb 72 and 74 Smith Street.(1953 - 1958)

***Newry ...*** Mrs. Ethel M. Newry has a home at 6 Mill Street. (1935 - 1937)

***Newton ...*** W. E. "Billy" Newton was a barber in the Odd Fellows Music Hall on Pleasant Street in 1900. The building burned in 1901.

***Nichols ...***

\*\*\* Clark J. Nichols is a B&M trainman, residing at 125 Central Street. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* Miss Eleanor M. Nichols is a student at Plymouth Normal School. She is boarding at 9 Gordon Place, the home of Isaiah Nichols. (1925) Eleanor is a teacher in Milford, still boarding at 9 Gordon Place, the home of Isaiah Nichols. (1929-31)

\*\*\* Isaiah Nichols is a brakeman for the B&M railroad. Isaiah and Harriett Nichols have a house at 9 Gordon Place. (1919) Isaiah is a laborer. (1925) Isaac is a crossing tender. (1925-29) Isaac Nichols died prior to 1935. Mrs. Nichol's is a housekeeper at 30 Highland Street, the home of Alvin D. Walker, where she boards. (1953 - 1955) Harriett died April 18th, 1955.

\*\*\* Reginald B. Nichols is general supervisor at 65 Central Street, the Opera Block, the Welfare Department, rooms 11 and 12. Reginald and Myrtle R. Nichols have a home at 125 Central Street. (1953 - 1958)

\*\*\* Rev. Reginald B. Nichols is pastor at the Methodist Church. (1943)

\*\*\* Miss Thelma L. Nichols is a clerk at John B. Straw's Grocery Store, at 147 Central Street. (1925) Thelma is teaching in Cohasset, Mass., and boarding with Isaac and Harriett Nichols at 9 Gordon Place. (1929-31)

***Nicholson (Sakelaris) ...*** John Nicolson is one of the owners of the Woodsville Cafe, 13-15 Central Street. Mrs. Mabel

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Nicolson is a waitress in the café. John and Mabel Nicolson have a home at 91 Central Street. (1929-31) The Nicholsons' now have a home off Pleasant Street. (1935 - 1937)

**Noel ...** Miss Mabel A. Noel is operating Grey Beauty Shoppe, 65 Central Street, room 6 in the Opera Block. Mabel is rooming in the Opera Block, room #18. (1929 - 1937)

**Normand ...** Joseph J. Normand is assistant spare crew foreman. Joseph and Charlotte H. Normand are boarding at 18 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of John T. Milette. (1935 - 1937)

**Norm s Carpet Service ...** 1967 ... no further info

**Norris ...**

\*\*\* Burnell C. Norris is employed at the F. J. Norris Store, 17 Central Street, the Bittinger Building. Brunell has a home in Wells River, Vermont. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* Frank J. Norris is manager of the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, at 17 Central Street. Frank and Bertha L. Norris have a home in Wells River, Vermont. (1925) Frank is owner of F. J. Norris Company, a grocery store at 17 Central Street, in the Bittinger-Pillsbury Block. Frank and Bertha L. Norris have a home in Wells River, Vermont. (1929 - 1955) Frank is a grocer at 27 Central Street and residing in Wells River, Vermont. (1956 - 1961)

\*\*\* Herbert F. Norris is employed at F. J. Norris & Sons Store at 17 Central Street, in the Bittinger-Pillsbury Block. Herbert and Ruth S. Norris have a home at 13a School Street. (1935 - 1937) Herbert is employed at Johnson Lumber Company. He and Ruth are living at 14 Beech Street. (1953 - 1958)

**North Court Street ...**This is a short Street that starts at the Covered Bridge and ends at Central Street, where the old underpass used to be. It is hard to determine, at the bridge, what is North Court Street and what is on Ammonoosuc Street. So, this next section will be about both streets and I'll toss in some of Oak Hill.

John Woods Mill, #1 North Court, was on the “town” side of the street, the odd numbers. That is now the power plant. Woods mill is covered in the “W” file. The old Peoples Market building was #15. Thinking of this will give you and idea of where #7 might be., and so on. Gaudias La Flamme's shoe shop was around #5 No. Court Street.

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He operated his shop in 1923. The Crystal Confectionery Co. was in the same are 1922 -1924. Hylas Church and W. A. Waterman sold used cars here around 1929. And then it became a Hudson & Essex sales room. Walker & Eastman started selling cars there 1933-1934. I think this was the same building Carleton Whitehead had his barber shop in the late 50's. He was in the right end of the building and an auto repair was in the left half. Walker & Eastman moved up to Central Street.

In 1938 Ashley Hazeltine and Roscoe Rinehart operated H&R Gulf Oil business here. The Twin State Tire Retreading Company was here in the mid forties.

Across the street at #8 North Court Street was the Woodsville Battery Station, Walter Keyes, proprietor. Keyes was here from 1923 unril he moved to 22 Douth Court Street in 1936. Silvio Pelligrinni was here until he had a new building put up next to People's Market.

At #9 North Court was the home of the Millers. Edgar Miller had a grocery store in his home until 1877 when he decided to move the store into the Weeks Block, the first store on the west side of the tracks, on the corner of Central and Pleasant Streets, now Laconia Savings Bank. Lizzie Miller, Edgars wife, lived in the house until 1929.

A building near #9, owned by Mrs. Miller, was rented to Mr. K. H. Sly, a blacksmith, by trade. Mr. Sly ran the ship from 1880 until 1882.

The building burned to the ground in 1892, while being used as a blacksmith shop by Joseph Martel. Martel then put up a small building for his blacksmith shop, in back of the Mt. Gardner Hotel. This was on the bank overlooking Connecticut Street, between what is now the bowling alley and McAllister Jewelers.

#15 North Court Street was the most utilized place on North Court Street. It was, in 1882, Mr. B. M. Blakes lunchroom, bar and pool room. Henry M. Smith, son of the shovel handle manufacrer at the Woods mill, opened Smith's Saloon and lunchroom, operated by Eugene Clough. In 1889 Dean Furniture open up on the second floor of #15. Dean moved to the Bittering Building at a later time.

Henry Smith died in October of 1892 and the estate hired Chase Woodman to run the saloon. H. W. Pitkon ran the Village restaurant here for a while and then sold it to Chase Woodman. At a later date Lizzie Miller married a Mr. Nutting and he took over running of the Village Restaurant, even to the point of putting on an addition in 1899.

Bernice Silver was running a restaurant here in early 1900.

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H. H. Whittier's Bakery and David Mitchell's Meat Market moved to #15 after the fire destroyed the Odd Fellows Hall and Music Hall, on Pleasant Street. Charles Butson had his meat market here in 1904 and in 1905 James McLean's pool room was upstairs.

In 1906 a fire upstairs gutted the entire building and Butson's Market had to relocate into the Stickney Bros. Brick Block on Highland Street, by the crossing.

In the meantime, David Mitchell purchased the remains of #15 and completely remodeled it into a three story building.. He had two store spaces on the ground floor and apartment on the top two floors.

Pope & Jackson rented one of the ground floor stores for a new market. In 1907 they sold the market to Charles Butson who, once again, was in business at #15 North Court Street.

David Mitchell died in 1912 and his widow sold the building to Butson. Mr. Butson hired James Lowe to jack up the building and build a new ground level store. The grand opening was in 1929.

Mr. Butson was in poor health in 1935 and sold the business to his nephew, S. H. Graham. Graham ran the business until 1948 when he sold it to C. Lincoln Butson and it became People's Market.

The market expanded into a chain of Butson's Markets and then became Shaw's. #15 North Court Street was torn down along with other buildings when the covered bridge became unpassable for vehicle traffic and the Raymond Burton Bridge was built. Most of the houses on North Court and the river side of the Monroe road had to be removed.

***Northern Supply ...***The Northern Supply building was moved across the street from the original round house in 1901, by James Lowe, a well know mover of buildings and contractor.

This land is where the Mt. Gardner House (burned 1886) once stood. The land was owned by John Davis in 1894 who sold it to Mr. Bracy, the photographer, from Wells River.

Once moved it become Henderson's Movie Picture Palace and in later years (1916) the bowling alley owned by Andrew Bagonzi and Charles Maccini.

***Northup ...***Miss Anna P. Northup is superintendent of the Cottage Hospital. Anna boards at the hospital on River Road. (1919)

***Notaries Publics ...***Evelyn Andrews 1957, Roland W. Cass 1953, H. K. Davison 1955, Winifred Eastman 1956, Robert Large 1957,

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Herman S. Mitchell 1957, Hazel Patten 1954, Roland Thayer 1957, Leslie Thompson 1950, Lionel W. Bouley 1957, Luigi Castello 1954, John Farnham 1954, Horace Knight 1954, Annie M. Johns 1954, Norman McMeekin 1957, Douglas Newbold 1950, Maurice Randall 1957, Eliza Thompson 1953, Bernice Walker 1953.

***Nurse ...***

\*\*\* Herbert E. Nurse is a yard brakeman for the Boston and Maine railroad. He rooms on Pleasant Street (1915).

\*\*\* J. B Nurse is an engineer for the railroad. He rooms at 13 Pleasant Street, room #5. (1919)

***Noyes ...***

\*\*\* Arthur Noyes is in the U. S. Air Force, boarding at 11 Walnut Street, the home of Roscoe E. Noyes. (1953 - 1955)

\*\*\* John A. Noyes is a farmer. John and Alice I. Noyes have a house on Highland Street (1915). John and Alice Noyes have removed to Bath, NH. (1919)

\*\*\* Lilla I. Noyes, widow of Charles E. Noyes, is boarding at 14 Maple Street, the Home for the Aged. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* Roscoe E. Noyes is a conductor on the railroad. Roscoe and Dorothy C, Noyes have a home at 11 Walnut Street. (1954 - 1958) Roscoe was on both of the last two trains to leave Woodsville; the last train from Woodsville to Plymouth and the last train from Woodsville to White River Junction.

\*\*\* William H. and Eva M. Noyes have a home rear of 55 or 56 South Court Street. (1925-31) William H. and Eva M. Noyes now have a home at 22 Elm Street. (1935 - 1937) Mrs. Noyes passed away on August 29th, 1943.

***Nugent ...***

\*\*\* Andrew J. Nugent is a car foreman. Andrew and Iva M. Nugent removed to Swanton, Vermont, prior to 1931. removed to

\*\*\* William J. Nugent is a carpenter William and Fannie have a house on King Street (1915).

***Nutter ...***

\*\*\* Miss Charlotte G. Nutter has a millinery business in the



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**Lovejoy Block, 107-111 Central Street (Tuck's Press). Charlotte rooms in the Sargent Block on Central Street (1915).**

**\*\*\* John Nutter is a laborer. John and Flora Nutter have a home at 8 Connecticut Street. (1925)**

**\*\*\* John Nutter is an employee at the railroad shop. John boards at 8 Connecticut Street, the home of John and Flora Nutter. (1925)**

**\*\*\* Maynard S. Nutter is a commercial photographer operating out of his residence on the Monroe Road. This house was a Sears fabricated home. Maynard specialized in Candid wedding photos and Commercial photography. He also took many Haverhill Academy and Youth Recreation pictures. The phone # in 1957 was 7-3759**

**\*\*\* Nathan H. Nutter operates Kimball and Nutter on the old Bath Road, now Melody Lane. This was the stage coach route from the Cobleigh Tavern (original Cottage Hospital) to the present route 10 between Way We Were Outlet Store and Walker Motors. (1919) Nathan is a horse dealer (N. H. Nutter), at 9 Pleasant Street. He and Altha S. Nutter have a home on River Road. (1925 - 1937) Nutter was a lumberman and horse dealer at the farm, 77 Melody Lane from 1900 to 1940 when he passed away.**

**\*\*\* Neal P. Nutter is a farmhand. Neal and Given H. Nutter board at N. H. Nutter's on River Road. (1925) Neal took over the farm after his fathers death in 1940.**

**\*\*\* Ray M. Nutter is a clerk for the B&M railroad and rooms at W. S. Nutters on Ammonoosuc Street (1915). Ray is chief clerk for the railroad, with a home in Bath, NH. (1925)**

**\*\*\* Miss Sally H. Nutter is a teacher in Bath, NH. Sally boards at 44 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of W. S. Nutter. (1919) Sally is teaching at Everett, Mass., and boarding at W. S. Nutter's, at 44 Ammonoosuc Street. (1925 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Miss Susan M. Nutter is a clerk at V.L. Carpenter & Son and rooms at 44 Ammonoosuc Street. (1915-25) Susan is teaching at Haverhill, Mass., and boarding at 44 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of W. S. Nutter. (1929 - 1937) Susan is teaching in Dover, NH, and boarding at 44 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of W. S. Nutter. (1955 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Vaughn A. Simms Nutter is a student at Woodsville High**

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School, boarding at 44 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of W. S. Nutter.  
(1929 - 1937)

\*\*\* W. Simms Nutter is a truck man. He and Minnie S. Nutter have a house on 44 Ammonoosuc Street. (1915-31) Simms is farming and they still live at 44 Ammonoosuc Street. (1935 - 1937)

***Nutting ...***

\*\*\* S. E. Nutting had a store in the original Odd fellows Block, on Pleasant Street. He carried home furnishings, carpets, ice boxes and sewing machines. Mr. Nutting operated the store from 1883 until 1886.

D. L. Hawkins and S. E. Nutting signed a 5 year lease on the Parker House, in 1884. They did many improvements until 1887 when they sold the hotel to Oscar D. Johnson.

\*\*\* Waldo A. Nutting is farmhand and has removed to Lisbon, NH.  
(1925)

\*\*\* William S. Nutting is a carpenter and has a house at 8 Ammonoosuc Street. (1919) (1925)

***Nychichuk ...*** Nicholas Nychichuk is a mechanic at Ames Motors, on Dartmouth College Highway. Nicholas is residing at 35 Central Street, in the Sargent Block. (1956 - 1958)
