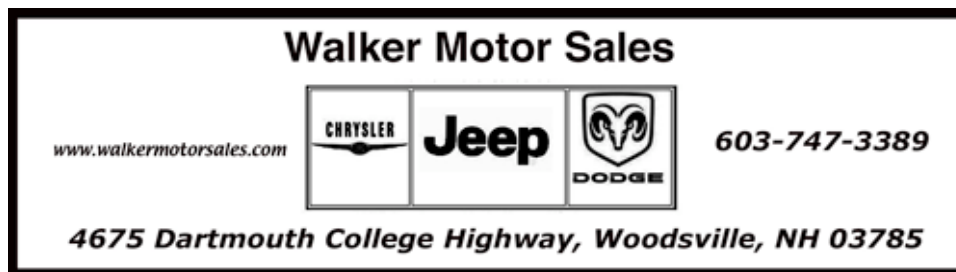

was the first hotel in Woodsville. It was originally built for use as a boarding house by Hortense Ramsay. Mrs. Ramsay sold the building to John L. Davis in 1872. The Parker House had a long history of different owners and managers. The hotels varied history all came to an abrupt ending in February of 1912. The fire broke out in the early morning hours and by days light the building was only a shell. Debris was cleared after the fire and a skating rink was made for the remained of the 1912-13 winter.

Mr. Henderson was operating his motion picture theatre in what was later to become the bowling alley. Mr. Richard Henderson purchased the old Parker House lot in 1913 and, soon after, built the Henderson Hotel. The new Hotel was completed in 1914 and Levi Kugelman, a clothier with a long history of doing business in Woodsville occupied one of the storefronts and was the first tenant to move into the new building, containing a moving picture theater and rooms for many railroad me.

Pleasant Street ... Pleasant Street is a very short street, from Central between what is now the two banks, Woodsville Guaranty and Laconia Savings banks. The street ran west to the ridge overlooking Connecticut Street, and then veered left and ended in back of the old Court House. Woodsville Guarantee Savings bank now owns all of the land and buildings on the south-east side of the street.

The Weeks Block was where Laconia Savings Bank is now located and the Odd fellows Blocks were where the parking lot behind the bank is presently situated.

#5 Pleasant Street. #5 was in the Weeks Block, but on the Pleasant Street side, and was selling discarded books in 1936. Harold Miller and Weldon DeCoteaux took over the shop in 1938. Mrs. Perley Klark ran the gift shop while Harold was in the Navy.

The store was remodeled in 1945 and operated for many years before moving into the Mulliken Block, at 89 central Street. The business was later moved to a large building on Main Street, in Lisbon, NH.

#7 Pleasant Street. This space was also in the Weeks Block, on the Pleasant Street side. It was a bottling company, operated by L. E. Collins. Collins operated from around 1886 until the early 1900's. He advertised bottling Ginger Ale, various Sodas, White Mountain Birch, Champagne Cider, Nerve Food, and also bottled various "harder" varieties of liquid. Collins bottles are very desirable in the

collectible world.

The bottling space became the barbering facilities of one Gilman Blake. He was commonly known as "Bart" Blake and was known to be the source for any news or information concerning the town and its inhabitants.

Bart Blake barbered in Woodsville for over 35 years.

#11 Pleasant Street. This building was, originally, the Tabor Block. It was a wood framed building used as a saloon and residence, until purchased by the Odd Fellows as a lodge hall. The purchase was made in 1882 and the building took on severe remodeling, including a third floor lodge meeting area.

There were three store spaces on the ground floor which were used by a variety of venders during the following years.

St. Luke's set up a public library with a selection of books they had collected; Dr. Gibson had an office here; and there was a printer and a hair dresser here.

S. E. Nutting offered home furnishings here from 1883 until 1886. Ai Willoughby had a meat market here in 1886 until 1889 when he sold out the business to Truman Glover. Glover soon moved the meat business to his new block at 83 Central Street.

The second floor housed C. G. Browne, a shoemaker-cobbler. T. H. Aulis was barbering on the second floor in 1890 and there were tenements on that floor.

Next door at #11 Pleasant street, between the Odd Fellows and the Weeks Block, was the Odd Fellows Music Hall. It was a grand building, set back a bit from the street, and was built in 1890.

There were three store spaces on the ground floor of the Music Hall and a public hall that would seat 500 on the second floor.

Q. A. Scott had his apparel store in the Weeks block and rented one of the Music Hall stores for storage of excess inventory, in 1882. He continued renting the space until 1897.

F. W. Whittier, from Tilton, NH, came here in 1891 and leased store #3 for use as a bakery. His business continued to grow to a point where he was offering home delivery; not only to those in Woodsville, but to surrounding towns, too.

A. H. Vallee had a restaurant in the Music Hall until 1893 when he sold his business to Charles W. Johnson, from Wells River, Vermont.

I. K. George operated a restaurant, pool, and billiards parlor in the Music Hall for several years around 1893.

L. C. Lovejoy came to Woodsville in 1896 and opened a meat market in 1896. He was not here long as he was building a building at 111 Central Street (Tuck's Press) and soon moved his business there.

Charles Newell moved into Lovejoy's vacancy in 1897 and started a restaurant. Mr. Newell was, also, an auctioneer and the tax collector. Newell sold the restaurant to Elmer Brown in 1898 who operated as the "Music Hall Luncheonette" and later sold it to O. W. Gordon, from Benton, NH.

W. E. Newton was barbering in the Music Hall in 1900 and H. H. Caswell was a jeweler here in 1901. The top floor in the Music Hall was used for entertainment, shows, suppers, plays, concerts, and the like. Both of the I. O. O. F. buildings burned to the ground on May 15th, 1901.

The Weeks Block, which many remember housing the A&P Store was on the

corner of Main and Pleasant streets. Collins Bottling Company was in back side of the building, on the Pleasant street side and the Wander-in Gift shop was also there.

The next building up Pleasant street was the Music Hall and the next building was the original wood framed Odd Fellows Block. They both burned in the fire of 1901.

There was a mad scramble for rental space for all of those businesses displaced by the fire. Many found refuge in the Henderson and Wentworth hotel buildings, as well as in other buildings in town.

Plans were set in motion, almost immediately after the fire, to replace the ruined buildings.

It was decided that the two buildings would be replaced with one large brick structure covering from #11 to #17 Pleasant Street. It was determined that James Lowe, a local and highly respected builder, would be the contractor. The building was completed in 1904.

During it's 50 year life span; this magnificent building housed a great many, businesses, individuals, and families. Some of the businesses and professionals were the Telephone Company in room #1 on the second floor, Woodsville Furniture Company, Farm Bureau Extension Service, Attorney Smith, F. P. Dearth Insurance, A. D. Davis deputy sheriff, Attorney Wright and Judge H. K. Davison.

Harold O. Taylor had a livery stable and garage in back of the block. H. H. Whittier came back in 1906 with a new bakery. F. K. Kittredge was selling carriages here and the Post office moved here in 1910. The Forestry Service and the Selective Service Office's were both here in the 40's, the American Legion was here until 1946.

The fire broke out just after midnight on January 13th, 1954. I was a junior at Woodsville High School and lived directly across from the Court House, on Court Street, at the time. My grandmother woke us all up and I remember standing on our front porch; watching the tremendous funnel of fire charging straight up, for hundreds of feet, over the Opera Block. In the morning the second Odd fellows Block was gone. Dr. Dearborn's home and office were, also, lost in the fire.

Many of us older set, remember the Mann residence. It was set back off Central (Main) Street, on Pleasant Street. There was a spacious front lawn. After the house was torn dow; a park was in the front lawn area.

The Opera Block to the left of the Mann residence and the barn was located near the rear of the Opera Block. For a ten year period, or longer, the Mann front lawn was where the Woodsville community Christmas tree was placed.

Lighting the tree was always an anticipated enjoyment. This tradition lasted fro around 1935 until 1945. The front lawn changed again around 1940 when benches were added for the comfort of shoppers, as downtown, at that time, was a very busy place. This "park" was located across from the Boston and Maine passenger depot, on the corner of Pleasant and Central Streets.

At that time nearly a hundred trains passed through Woodsville on a daily schedule. This was a most convenient place for people waiting for trains to arrive to wait in comfort. I have spent many an hour on the bench near the street, with by feet propped against that beautiful shade tree, watching all, or nothing at all.
